## ***To Drill or not to drill.....***

At our last meeting Mitch Thomas introduced us (assuming all of us) to the skill of drilling ceramic containers. A couple of us had requested the diamond glass drill bits. Mitch brought four which were eagerly snapped up after the demonstration.

It's one thing to own a new toy (in this case a drill bit) it's another to use it without destroying the ceramic pot or the drill itself. Or worse, electrocuting yourself. That last sentence, hopefully, got your attention.

As Mitch told us "electricity and water don't mix".

The instructions were simple enough and, unlike art appreciation, absolute. Skip or ignore any, well, you might make an expensive 'start over'.

The scenario is use a cordless drill. Drill wet . Do not backup, support the object with material that will gum up the drill bit. This will easily ruin a \$10 tool. Also important is removing the drilled material before it solidifies inside the hollow shaft of the bit. In the case of a three quarter inch slab that would be about 3-4 times. When timely, the material is easily pushed out of the hollow area of the bit with a piece of 3mm aluminum wire.

The day after the meeting I drilled five  $\frac{1}{4}$ " holes in a stone slab made by Joe Day.

One particular need for this drill bit is to improve the poor drainage on some ceramic pots. Which is exactly the case of this ceramic container -

Mitch pointed out at the meeting the glass drill bit doesn't have a centered point or any point to guide the driller (that's you and me) to a specific location. Suggestion - go slow and steady or the drill bit will meander around the material like a cowboy on Saturday night.
